Step-By-Step		
Anticipate	Write the word "community" on the board and ask, "Can anyone define community?" After discussion, show the slides with the different definitions of community: "Community: a group of people who live together in the same area; a group of people with common interests or who perform similar jobs."	
Explain	Inform the class that today's lesson will focus on identifying the different communities we all belong to and how respecting and participating in communities relates to being a good citizen/resident of our island.	
Discussion	Ask the participants to identify different communities they belong to. Discuss the reasons why they feel the groups are communities.	
Activity	 Split the class into two teams. Have a participant from each group volunteer to guess the type of community that will come up on the screen behind the participant. Each team will take a turn to describe the community on the screen to help their teammate correctly identify the slide. Advise the participants to raise their hands with their descriptions and wait to be called on by their teammate guessing the slide. Have 10 slides listing different types of communities – 1 community per slide 1. Family 2. School 3. Work 4. Church 5. Village 6. Friends 7. Girl/Boy Scouts 8. Cultural Group 9. Law enforcement/Military 10. Rugby Team

	 Participants who need extra assistance may be given pre-made 	

	 materials in which they only need to fill in certain pieces of missing information. Students who need to be challenged may be required to find additional information or be given a special project he/she can share with his peers. 	 Were there any groups that you thought did not make up a community? Why did you feel that way?
	 Why did you reer that way? Why is it important for people to belong to communities? What can we do to help people feel welcome or part of our different
	communities on Guam?
Journal	Write down all of the communities you belong to, identify the members of your different communities and write down 3 things each community does together. Write down all of the communities you want to be part of when you get older.
