Step-By-Step		
Anticipate	Type the word "responsibility" on the screen and ask "What does responsibility mean to you?" After some discussion, type the definition on the screen:	
	<ul> <li>Responsibility means <ul> <li>a) doing what needs to be done;</li> <li>b) being reliable and dependable;</li> <li>c) being accountable for your actions, not making excuses or blaming others;</li> <li>d) fulfilling your moral obligations;</li> <li>e) using good judgment, thinking about consequences of your actions;</li> <li>f) exercising self-control.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Social Responsibility is an obligation for each individual in a community to act for the benefit of society at large by minimizing the adverse effects to those around them.</li> </ul>	
Explain	Inform the class that the lesson will focus on exploring the importance of personal responsibility in everyday life, the effects of responsibility on relationships, and the importance of social responsibility in a community/village/island.	
Discussion	Pass out the Responsibility and Respect self-evaluations and give the students five (5) minutes to complete the evaluations. Discuss the students' answers and have them provide examples for each question answered and ways to improve.	
Activity	As a large group, have the students brainstorm issues or places they have seen in their community that make them angry because the situation illustrates a lack of respect and responsible choices or actions. Break into smaller groups and pick one issue per group and brainstorm ways to address	

	the issue and follow through with actions to improve the situation.

Discussion	<ul> <li>De-Brief the Activity: Engage in a discussion with the students. Examples of questions:</li> <li>How was the issue/situation a result of irresponsibility and lack of respect?</li> <li>Who has the responsibility to do something in these situations?</li> <li>What can we do as citizens and members of the community to prevent these situations from happening again?</li> </ul>
Journal	10 -15 minutes: Write, in detail, about a time when you did something really irresponsible. Why did it happen? How did you feel about it? Did your irresponsibility affect anyone else? Did it cause problems? How do you feel about it now? What did you learn from it?
